The third row of the field was planted to this third species (the unnamed one) and it was harvested a week before row 2. The row was 463 feet long and the yield, when harvested precisely as the other, was 13,190 pounds, or at the rate of 77.03 tons to the acre for two seasons' growth.

Prickly Pear Santa Rita | Sierra Vista Growers

Native to southwestern U.S. and northern Mexico. Rounded pads are blue-gray with a tinge of purple in summer, darkening to a rich purple-red in winter. Spines line the upper edges and clusters of glochids dot the pads. Pads up to 8" long. Fruit purple and fleshy. Fast growth rate.
